More Bands Added to 30th Annual Thanksgiving Festival

Since the last issue of the *Jazz Rambler* was published, bands have been added to the lineup of the 30th Annual San Diego Thanksgiving Dixieland Jazz Festival:

- **Tim Laughlin and his New Orleans All Stars featuring Connie Jones....** The All-Stars were a hit at the 2008 Festival. The audiences were thrilled by the band's performances of New Orleans music, featuring Connie's world-class cornet work and Tim's authentic Crescent City style. AFCDJS is pleased to welcome the All-Stars for a return engagement in 2009.

- **Cash Kings....** This band pays tribute to the music sung by American icon Johnny Cash. Led by vocalist Johnny G. D'Artenay (visiting San Diego from his new home in Nashville), the Cash Kings perform in the authentic style of Cash's bands of the '50s and '60s. Come early to get a good seat. Last year, the Cash Kings filled every room they played in.

- **Dixie Express....** A San Diego band that evolved from the AFCDJS Free Dixieland Workshops and the Adult Jazz Camps into one of the best jazz groups in the area. Dixie Express performs a wide-ranging repertoire every

- **The Hayriders....** The interpretations of music made famous by Elvis Presley, Carl Perkins, Bill Haley and other '50s "Rockabillys" drew S.R.O. crowds at the 2008 Thanksgiving Festival.

Regretfully, pianist **Neville Dickie** has withdrawn from the Festival due to a scheduling conflict. He is set to perform for British Royalty the same weekend as our event!

Real Gone will step aside as the Hayriders and Cash Kings will be in charge of the Rockabilly sounds, together with **Dave Bennett**, who will play and sing a tribute to "The Killer" – Jerry Lee Lewis.

Due to financial considerations, it was necessary to cut **Billy Mata** and his fine band from the 2009 program. Please make your Festival reservations *now* so that AFCDJS will be able to keep the remaining lineup intact!

PASSINGS

Jim Cunningham

(1919-2009)

James V. Cunningham, longtime convention manager at the Town & Country Hotel and AFCDJS Executive Director, passed away in Florence, Oregon on May 19.

Mr. Cunningham grew up in Florida where as a teenager he sang on the radio and in nightclubs. He entered the hotel industry in 1937 as an elevator operator. Later he became a hotel manager in Miami Beach. He served in the US Army in WWII and was an engine tester at the Air Force base (now Wright-Patterson Field) in Dayton, Ohio.

In the late 1950s, Mr. Cunningham transformed the Wagon Wheel Lodge in Rockton, Illinois into a convention hotel — a precursor to his tenure at the Town & Country.

In 1969 he moved to San Diego and

worked as convention manager at the Town & Country where he remained for 16 years. He was a recipient of the Gold Key Award from the Hotel Sales Management Association International and received the first lifetime career achievement award from that organization. There is also an annual merit award, presented by the San Diego chapter of a hotel industry group, named for Jim Cunningham. His emphasis on providing “personalized service” extended to his staff and co-workers and continues in the day-to-day operations of the Town & Country.

He was the liaison between the hotel and the San Diego Thanksgiving Dixieland Jazz Festival from the beginning, and from 1985 to 1995 was the Executive Director of AFCDJS. Following his tenure with the jazz society, Mr. Cunningham retired to Oregon.

He is survived by his wife, Helen; two daughters, Kat Cunningham and

Maryann Galer of Oregon; two grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

K.O. Eckland

(1926-2009)

Jazz pianist Kenneth Eckland was born in Cleveland, Ohio in 1926 and was raised in Berkeley, California. During WWII he served in the Army Air Corps and returned to the Bay Area after resuming civilian life. In the late '40s he frequented Hambone Kelly's in El Cerrito, as a fan of Lu Watters' Yerba Buena Jazz Band. Mr. Eckland was particularly drawn to the music of pianists Paul Lingle, Burt Bales and Wally Rose.

In the 1960s Mr. Eckland lived with his wife and children in Los Angeles, where he was a commercial artist for the *LA Times* and played with several jazz bands including the Tailgate Ramblers. In 1962 he replaced Frank Thomas as the pianist with the Firehouse Five Plus Two and remained with them until the group disbanded in 1971.

Mr. Eckland moved to Pismo Beach in 1976 and worked as a writer. He was one of the founders of the Central Coast Hot Jazz Society (a/k/a Basin Street Regulars) and published the BSR newsletter *Offbeat*. He also organized the Pismo Beach Jubilee By The Sea — now considered to be one of the best jazz festivals anywhere.

In the late '70s, Mr. Eckland led a wild traditional jazz band called “The World Famous Desolation Jazz Ensemble and Mess Kit Repair Battalion.” Later, he put together the “Pismo Experimental Jazz Band.” One of his original compositions from this time period, “Sundown Mama,” is still popular with traditional jazz bands around the world.

In the early 1990s he joined the Frisco Syncopators, which included another veteran of the Firehouse Five Plus Two — soprano saxophonist George Probert. Mr. Eckland appeared with the Syncopators at many West Coast festivals, including the San Diego Thanksgiving Dixieland Jazz Festival from 1990 to 1995 and recorded two CDs with them. He continued to write for a variety of

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publications and was the author of *Jazz West*; an encyclopedia of musicians, bands and events related to West Coast Jazz. His writing, always laced with dry humor and sharp wit, was a joy to read. An oft-cited example of his humor could be found on his business card, which read “K.O. Ec3kland.” He would wait for a puzzled expression on the recipient’s face, then explain, “The ‘3’ is silent.”

In 2004, Mr. Eckland relocated to Paradise, California to live closer to his family. He passed away on May 4. He is survived by his wife, Faye; son Daniel; daughters Nancy Berkley and Taina Klaus; grandsons Ryan and Beau Berkley; former wife Lucille and Waldo the Cat.

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Jim Goodwin

(1944-2009)

One of the hottest jazz cornetists in history, James Goodwin, passed away

in Portland, Oregon on Apr. 19, 2009

Goodwin was born in Portland. His father, Bob, was an excellent jazz drummer who recorded with Hitch’s Happy Harmonists in the 1920s. Jim Goodwin served in the Oregon National Guard and worked briefly as a stockbroker (the youngest in the U.S.) but preferred the life of a musician to a 9-to-5 job. In the Northwest, he played with the Great Excelsior Jazz Band, Monte Ballou, Don Kinch’s Conductors Ragtime Band, Jim Beatty’s Jazz Band and others. Goodwin also spent a considerable amount of time in the Bay Area, where he was the first choice cornetist for bands such as the Golden Age Jazz Band, Berkeley Rhythm, Jazz Cardinals and the NOJCNC All Stars. He also played a long-running engagement with pianist Ray Skjelbred at the Bull Valley Inn in Port Costa.

During the ’70s, Goodwin played extensively in Europe, including appearances at the Oude Stijl Music Festival in Breda, Holland. He toured with the Sunset Music Company and played with George Probert’s Happy Riff Machine, among others. His nickname was “Kid Goodwin”—a nod to

his perennially youthful appearance and his red hot cornet playing (“Kid Louis” and “Kid Muggsy” enjoyed similar status in previous years).

Back in the States, Goodwin was a partner in the Portland Brewing Co., at the beginning of the microbrew craze of the 1980s. However, he forsook the business side of the brewery, preferring instead to play duets with pianist Dave Frishberg at the company’s Flanders Street Pub. An *Arbors* CD, “Double Play,” documents the Goodwin/Frishberg musical alliance and celebrates both musicians’ devotion to baseball.

Goodwin was married briefly and later was in a long-lasting relationship with vocalist Rhetta Christie. He enjoyed living in a rustic setting near Astoria, Oregon and playing music on cornet or piano when the spirit moved him. (Goodwin was also a terrific pianist and drummer though few recordings exist of him playing these two instruments).

From the 1990s until his death, Goodwin played infrequently, often turning down prestigious gigs because they were either musically uninteresting or too regimented. The occasions when he did play are still fondly remembered by the fortunate members of the audience. He stopped playing cornet entirely after losing a front tooth and died from the effects of alcoholism.

Jim Goodwin was a true individual, who played a completely unique style on cornet, piano and drums. However, he was revered around the globe for the fiery sound of his cornet. He dressed in an updated 1930s style (complete with newsboy cap and Oregon duck shoes) and was equally at home living at a friend’s house or in the woods. He abstained from drug use, was scrupulous in repaying debts and his gentlemanly demeanor forbade the use of swearing. His death was a huge loss to the world of jazz and to his many admirers.

Unfortunately, many of Jim Goodwin’s recordings are not currently in print. However, the aforementioned “Double Play” is still available. Two more sessions worth finding are “Taking A Chance” (duets with pianist Ray Skjelbred, on the *Rhythm Master* label) and a recently-released CD of the Sunset Music Company, recorded live in Europe in 1979, on *Blue Swing*.

A 1943 *Keynote* session, with Johnny Guarneri (piano), Slam Stewart (bass) and Sid Catlett (drums), produced four of Young's greatest recordings: "Sometimes I'm Happy," "I Never Knew," "Afternoon of a Basie-It" and "Just You, Just Me."

He also rejoined the Basie Orchestra in 1943, appearing on a number of studio and broadcast recordings, including small-band sessions with Basie sidemen.

Young's ultra-hip demeanor was captured onscreen in Gjon Mili's classic film "Jammin' the Blues," which also featured Jones, Sid Catlett, John Simmons, Marlowe Morris, Barney Kessel, Illinois Jacquet, Harry "Sweets" Edison and others. Shortly after completing the filming, Young was drafted.

Though he was horrifyingly unfit for the armed services, Young was inducted into the US Army and sent to Ft. McLellan, Alabama. Almost immediately he ran afoul of the military prohibition against drug use when an officer discovered drugs in Young's locker. Two sympathetic officers lobbied for an early discharge, but to no avail. Instead, Young was sent to the guardhouse at Camp Gordon, Georgia. Years later he was reluctant to discuss the details of his remaining time in the Army, but his closest associates were aware of the physical and mental humiliation that Young endured. Finally, after receiving a dishonorable discharge, he returned to the world of music.

Some observers believe that Lester Young never recovered from his Army ordeal, and that his postwar playing lacked the spark that characterized his earlier work. There is some truth to the observation, though Young could still play with incredible spirit and creativity.

He toured around the world with Jazz at the Philharmonic during the 1950s. Young was less than thrilled by the gladiatorial aspects of the concerts (sax battles, drum battles, etc.) but generally managed to play consistently well. And if the JATP troupe wound up in a European city with a jazz club, Lester Young would be there as soon as the concert ended, to jam with the local musicians. During

his time with JATP, Young became fast friends with the young pianist Bobby Scott (nicknamed "Socks"). Scott has written extensively of his friendship with Young and his narrative is invaluable in understanding Young's personality and worldview as a middle-aged living legend.

After leaving JATP, Young always tried to give work to "the kiddies" — younger musicians like trumpeter Jesse Drakes, pianist Gildo Mahones and bassist John Ore whose playing he admired.

Though he was still celebrated as a great innovator, at home and abroad, the idolatry for Lester Young's playing eventually became problematic. When Charlie Parker, Charlie Christian or Frank Sinatra showed a distinct Lester Young influence in their performances, it reflected well upon the man who inspired them. But a new generation of tenor saxophonists, including Wardell Gray, Zoot Sims, Stan Getz, Herbie Steward, Allen Eager, Brew Moore, Al Cohn and — most notably — Paul Quinichette actually began to eclipse their mentor by the late '50s. Young often appeared to be tired, drunk, high or a combination of the three. By contrast, his disciples usually played with drive and high spirits. The difference was most apparent when Young was paired with one of his followers in a concert or club. He was particularly distressed when performing alongside Paul Quinichette, who came closer to Young's sound than any other saxophonist. One night at Birdland in New York City, Young and Quinichette were alternating sets. Young told a friend, "I don't know whether to play like me or like Lady Q, because he's playing so much like me." (Fellow reedman Pee Wee Russell underwent a similar situation in England, when he was booked to play alongside English clarinetist Archie Semple). In Russell's case, the similarities in style pushed him to play more inventively than before. But Young's tendency was to just give up.

Except for a brief and happy appearance with a young band at Olivia's Patio Lounge in Washington, D.C., Young withdrew more and more into himself. He left his wife and children and took a room at the Alvin Hotel. There, his window faced

Birdland and he spent hours watching other musicians go to work. He played records, but showed little interest in performing. He drank heavily, but ate little and disregarded all pleas to take care of himself. He accepted an invitation to tour Europe in 1959, but his health was so fragile that he cut the trip short to go home. Within a few hours of returning, he died in his room at the Alvin on Mar. 15, 1959.

Despite his untimely and unnecessary death, Lester Young's spirit is gloriously alive in the many recordings made between 1936 and 1959 which are, luckily, almost all available on CD. Furthermore, he continues to inspire new generations of saxophonists, from Scott Hamilton to Anita Thomas and beyond. Even 50 years after his passing, "Pres" is still The Prophet of the tenor sax.

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They Called it Jazz

Lester Young – Prophet of the Tenor Sax

Lester Young's first recorded solo (on "Shoe Shine Boy") was — and still is — a life-altering experience. He danced around the beat, playing with an incredibly light sound. He indulged in a bit of humor, placing an accent in a different spot than the one played by drummer Jo Jones and trading lighthearted phrases with pianist Basie. Throughout the side, Young played with a supple sense of rhythm and a beautiful singing tone that owed much more to Bix Beiderbecke and Frank Trumbauer than Coleman Hawkins. All the sides by "Jones-Smith Incorporated" are classics, but none more than "Shoe Shine Boy" which introduced generations to a new way to play tenor sax.

The Basie Orchestra continued to gain popularity as the '30s wore on and they recorded frequently. Young was featured on a majority of the records, including "Every Tub," "Jumpin' at the Woodside," "Taxi War Dance," "Clap Hands, Here Comes Charlie," "Tickle Toe," "Louisiana," "Five O'Clock Whistle" and a number that was to become his signature tune — "Lester Leaps In" — recorded with a small band drawn from Basie's Orchestra.

In addition to his recordings with Basie, Young was featured on many of the sides recorded by vocalist Billie Holiday. The empathy between the singer and the saxophonist was palpable, and the results continue to delight listeners.



Of particular interest to traditional jazz fans, Young also played clarinet on a few sides with Basie, with organist Glenn Hardman and on a wonderful session for *Commodore* by the "Kansas City Six," which also included Buck Clayton (trumpet), Eddie Durham (electric guitar), Freddie Green (acoustic guitar), Walter Page (bass) and Jo Jones (drums). Young's clarinet sound on these records, particularly "I Want A Little Girl," is often compared to Pee Wee Russell. Though Young claimed Benny Goodman and Artie Shaw as inspirations, the haunting, poetic quality that infused Russell's playing is also present in Young's. Years later, French jazz writer Francois Postif interviewed Young and asked why he had not recorded more on clarinet. "One of my friends stole it," Young replied cryptically.

Though Young played jam sessions with Goodman, only a few recordings exist of the two giants playing together — Goodman's 1938

Carnegie Hall Concert, with an extended "jam session" including Young; two sides recorded Mar. 19, 1938 with Goodman's Orchestra (plus "ringers" Freddie Green and Walter Page) and the marvelous 1940 rehearsal (luckily it was recorded) with the two reedmen plus Buck Clayton, Basie, Green, Page, Jones and electric guitarist Charlie Christian. Christian was one of the first instrumentalists who played something other than reeds to be heavily influenced by Lester Young. On this date, many of Christian's solo ideas and his very phrasing were inspired by Young's playing.

By late 1940, Young had tired of Basie's big band arrangements and he was in search of opportunities to play with small groups. He left Basie on Dec. 13 and played with small combos around New York City before relocating to Los Angeles in May, 1941. There he worked with brother Lee's combo. That group went to New York in 1942, to perform at Café Society. During this period, Lester Young donned his trademark item of clothing — a pork pie hat. He also developed a reputation as the hippest of hipsters, speaking in a language that only his closest associates could understand. "Great big eyes" described his enthusiasm for a sympathetic musical situation; "ding dong" was a seal of disapproval; "ivey-divey" was an expression of disbelief. He often referred to fellow musicians as "Lady." Thus, his old friend Jo Jones became "Lady Jo." When asked about this peculiar affectation, Young replied, "Ladies are beautiful people. So are musicians."

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
